Key Vocabulary

Allied Powers	A name given to Britain, the Soviet Union, France and the USA.
Axis Powers	A name given to Germany, Italy and Japan.
Invasion	Bringing armed forces into another country to intimidate or attack.
Dictatorship	A system of government in which an individual is given total power and must be obeyed by all people at all times.
Radar	Radars could pick up incoming enemy aircraft at a range of 80 miles.
Ally	An alliance is an agreement to help each other in times of war. A country's allies are on its side and must battle against common enemies.
Rationing	A system that restricts people's right to buy more than a designated amount of certain foods.
Evacuation	A system for removing children from industrial cities likely to be bombed; children were moved to safe zones, usually in the countryside.
Air Raid	An attack in which bombs are dropped from aircraft on to a ground target.



WW2 was fought between 1939-1945

The war was fought between two sides: The Allied Powers (including the UK, the Soviet Union, France, USA) and Axis Powers (including Germany, Italy, Japan)



Adolph Hitler was a dictator.

War broke out when Hitler invaded Poland, an ally of Britain and France.



The Battle of Britain was a series of air attacks and was won by Britain and the RAF.

The Battle Of Britain caused Hitler to call off his planned invasion of Britain.

The Battle of Britain was the turning point in WW2 as it showed that Germany could be stopped.



Primary historical sources can be used to tell us about WW2 including interviews, eye witness accounts, newspaper reports, photographs, posters and artefacts.



The government issued rationing to make sure there was enough food for everyone.

The government evacuated many children from the cities to the countryside to be safe from aerial raids.



The period of bombing of cities by the German army was known as the Blitz.
