


Globalisation: how many miles do our clothes travel?

Key Vocabulary – Global Trade	
Globalisation	The process of the world's countries becoming more connected as a result of international trade and cultural exchange.
Trade	Trade is the buying and selling of goods and services we want and need.
Global supply chain	A system of production in which clothing, food and many other items pass through a long line of factories, suppliers, buyers and warehouses before ending up in shops on our high streets.
Multi-national company	A multinational company is a business that operates in many different countries at the same time.
Export	Exports are goods that are produced in your own country and shipped to another country for sale
Import	Imports are goods that are bought by residents of a country, but they are manufactured or grown in a different country.
Fairtrade 	A worldwide movement that aims to help farmers and producers in less economically developed countries (LEDCs). The term fair trade means that they receive a fair price for the goods that they produce. Many products, including coffee, sugar, tea, cotton, wine, bananas, and handicrafts, are traded this way.
Global citizen and global citizenship	A global citizen is someone who is aware of and understands the wider world - and their place in it. They take an active role in their community, and work with others to make our planet more equal, fair and sustainable. Global citizenship helps young people to build their own understanding of world events.

Key Vocabulary – Time Zones	
Lines of latitude and longitude	Latitude and longitude are a system of lines used to describe the location of any place on Earth. Lines of latitude run in an east-west direction across Earth. Lines of longitude run in a north-south direction. Although these are only imaginary lines , they appear on maps and globes as if they actually exist.
Greenwich Mean Time GMT	Greenwich Mean Time (GMT) is the mean solar time at the Royal Greenwich Observatory in Greenwich near London.
Prime/Greenwich Meridian	An imaginary line that divides Earth into two equal parts: the Eastern Hemisphere and the Western Hemisphere. The prime meridian is also used as the basis for the world's time zones. The prime meridian appears on maps and globes. It is the starting point for the measuring system called longitude.
Time zone	A time zone is an area on Earth that has a specific time that all citizens can set their clocks to. Different places on Earth have different time zones . This is because when it is day-time on one side of the earth , it is night-time on the other side.
